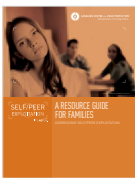

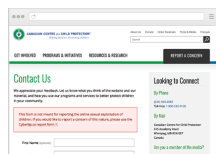
## Free Personal Safety Resources

## Kids in the Know® Program

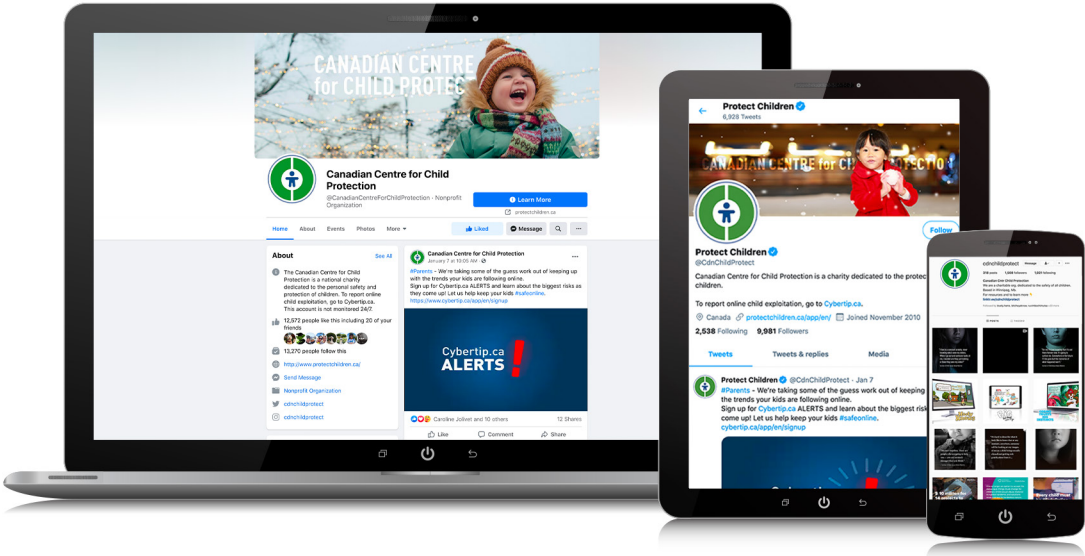
